

Little naturalness: Forests with sustainable forestry and limited clearcuts






Artificial forest: Intensive forestry and regular largescale clear cuts



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






Figure 1: A spectrum of forest management goals. Graphic simplified after Brockerhoff et al 2008

7 factors directly related to management




Diagram of 7 factors of the "Index of Biodiversity Potential".
